THE SERVICE OF DEDICATION (The congregation will rise)

Leader:

The great head of the Church gave gifts to men that some should be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, for the equipment of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of the faith and the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ.

Congregation:

We are the Church all kinds and conditions of men, but one body of Christ and individually members one of another.

Leader:

There are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; there are varieties of working, but it is the same God who inspires them all in every one. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.

For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and bestows his riches upon all who call upon him. So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes by the preaching of Christ.

Congregation:

But how are men to call upon him in whom they have not believed? and how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? and how are they to hear without a preacher? and how can men preach unless they are sent?

Leader:

In the presence of God we have met here, to acknowledge the call of these students to leadership in the Church of Christ; to celebrate their fulfillment of all requirements set by this faculty for academic degrees; to honor them for their perseverance, faithfulness, and diligence in study; and to present them again to the Church in whose ministries they aspire to serve.
