is the Albert A. List Professor of Jewish Studies at Harvard Divinity School and professor of Eastern languages and civilizations at Harvard University, where he earned his undergraduate, master's and doctoral degrees. Before joining the Harvard faculty in 1988,



he taught at the University of Chicago and at Wellesley College. A prolific writer and popular speaker, his books include Esther (1997), Death and Resurrection of the Beloved Son: The Transformation of Child Sacrifice in Judaism and Christianity (1995) and Sinai and Zion: An Entry into the Jewish Bible (1985), as well as many scholarly articles.





The Faithfulness in Ministry Cross

The Faithfulness in Ministry Cross award was established in 1991 by the Luther Seminary Alumni/ae Council to "identify, recognize, celebrate, and give thanks for alumni, both clergy and lay, who have lived lives of faithfulness in ministry." It is a miniature of the Celtic cross that stands in front of Bockman Hall, a replica of what is believed to be the first Christian symbol in Scandinavia, dating from 1000 A.D.

The three 1999 honorees were selected based on faithful service in three categories: urban/suburban ministry, small town/rural ministry; and specialized ministry. With this special recognition Luther Seminary honors the ministries of all its graduates.

Wolff, '52; 1994 - Paul A. Hanson, '50, and Morris M. Johnson, '55; 1995 - Robert L. Anderson, '52, Barbara Andrews, '69, and George Thompson, '53; 1996 - Harris A. Hostager, '60, and Roger W. Peterson, '60; 1997 - Rolf Aaseng, '50, Alvin J. Bergh, '59, and James H. Hanson, '54; 1998 - Willard H. Lund, '48, Raymond S. Rosales, '60, and Darrell M. Vetter, '68.

Candidates for the Faithfulness in Ministry Cross must be alumni of Luther Seminary or its antecedent schools who have demonstrated exemplary service in ministry. They should be nominated by fellow alumni or other colleagues. No member of the Luther Seminary faculty or staff is elipible.

The Alumni/ae Council welcomes nominations for the Faithfulness in Ministry Cross at any time. The deadline for nominations to be considered for next year's awards is Aug. 15. A nomination form is in the convocation packet. The selection committee consists of two members of the Luther Seminary faculty, four members of the Alumni/ae Council, and one member of the Luther Seminary staff.

1998-99 Faithfulness in Ministry Cross Honorees

A. Trueman Daniels, '66

Rural/Small Town Ministry



Counseling and reconciliation are the two main characteristics of Trueman Daniels' role in ministry. He has served as a pastor at numerous congregations throughout the northern Minnesota synods and served as a pioneer in interim ministry.

Many of Pastor Daniels' colleagues are quick to mention his gifts as a "skilled healer," counselor, listener, and special friend. As an intentional interim pastor, he often visited troubled parishes and counseled and reconciled hurting pastors and congregations. "He showed an appreciation for and valued all people especially those who seem to 'color outside the lines'," one colleague said.

While Trueman Daniels mainly served congregations in northern Minnesota, he spent some time in a congregation in Nome, Alaska. He learned from the Alaska Native people there and began a teaching and leadership ministry. He prepared worship materials for congregations of the peninsula area and helped prepare an Eskimo leader for ordination.

With the attitude, "I can't assist in this time unless we've broken bread," Pastor Daniels recognized the need for interim ministry and worked to develop it. In the early 1980's, he started a group called "intentional interim." At that time, the group consisted of a faithful few, but since then has grown tremendously in participants and resources.

Palmer Gedde, '57

Urban/Suburban Ministry



astor Palmer Gedde has accomplished much in his 34 years of pastoral service. With a unique, proactive approach to church and community leadership, he has participated as a leader and consultant for many church and community initiatives.

Many creative ministries resulted from Pastor Gedde's strong stewardship and mission concerns and focus on church and community leadership. He constantly encouraged congregation members to share Christ with the community. His encouragement prompted the formation of ministries that have helped many people and communities in Washington and Oregon.

The resulting ministries provide a variety of services such as community-wide counseling and chaplaincy services ("Tri-Cities Chaplaincy"); low-income, subsidized housing for the elderly ("Lutheran Senior Center"); weekly, television church services ("Good News Media Ministry"); and financial gifts to neighboring churches and community initiatives ("Richland Lutheran Church Foundation").

These ministries reflect a pastor who possesses uncommon gifts, who has used those gifts uncommonly well, and whose work has been a faithful witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ," commented one of his colleagues.



Specialized Ministry



t age 86 Pastor Erman K. Lunder continues strong in teaching the Bible and leading Bible conferences. Lunder served as a pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church, St. Albans, Long Island, NY (1944-48), and faculty member at Lutheran Bible Institute (LBI), Minneapolis (1948-49), New York (1949-50), and Seattle (1953-1978).

Since his retirement from LBI, Seattle, in 1978, Erman Lunder has continued his work with Bible studies and conferences on the Institute's behalf as professor emeritus. During 1997, he drove a total of 7,076 miles, conducting 20 Bible conferences and seminars, giving 148 Bible studies and sermons, and teaching at LBI, Hawaii, while leading a Bible fellowship in his home town.

Pastor Lunder regularly travels throughout the western region for three-to five-day conferences and teaches for two months during the summer at LBI, Hawaii. This year, he is scheduled to lead 10 conferences and seminars.

Considering himself "not retired, but re-fired," Pastor Lunder's dedication to helping others find their resources in Jesus Christ and God's place for effective Christian leadership is a driving force in all his accomplishments.

Pastor Lunder cannot be present at tonight's banquet. He will attend tomorrow's Table Talk luncheon and receive his award at that time.

Each will speak briefly about defining moments, guiding forces and high points (and perhaps instructive low points) in their ministries.
